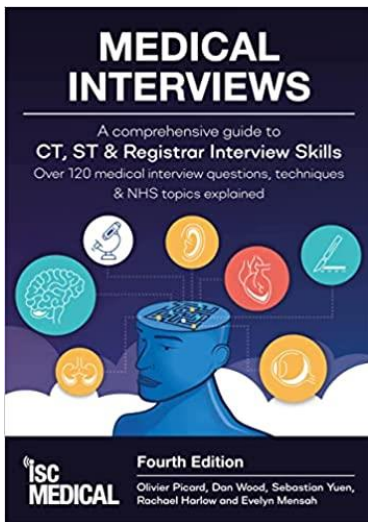

Anti-racism work in NHS Library & Knowledge Services



Back in June, a Tik Tok video from an NHS doctor highlighted a racist model answer in the 1st and 2nd editions of *Medical Interviews: A comprehensive guide to CT, ST & Registrar interview skills*.

The question asked what a consultant should do if a patient refuses to be seen by a Black registrar. The answer suggested that a patient refusing to see a Black doctor is the same as a female doctor refusing to see a convicted rapist. This automatically criminalises the Black doctor and excuses the patient's racism by arguing that there may be "valid reasons" for the patient to behave in such a way.

Health Education England (HEE) have withdrawn both the 1st and 2nd editions of this book and made funds available for all NHS Library and Knowledge Services to purchase the 4th edition. Both the 3rd and 4th editions of the book are in stock in ULHT libraries.

BMJ Best Practice Comorbidities Manager

The Comorbidities Manager has been added to the national BMJ Best Practice subscription purchased by Health Education England.

In the UK alone, one in three patients admitted to hospital as an emergency has five or more conditions.

This poses a significant problem for healthcare systems. Clinical guidelines only focus on single conditions, but failure to treat the whole patient leads to worse clinical outcomes, and longer lengths of stay.

The Comorbidities Manager is designed to inform treatment decision making in scenarios where a patient is admitted with an acute condition but also has one or more chronic conditions.
