Beclometasone inhaler-induced recovery of refractory peri-ileostomy skin complications

Peristomal skin complications (PSCs) are relatively common in ostomy patients, particularly in those with ileostomies. Non-healing irritation presents a clinical challenge and leads to pain and impaired quality of life for patients. Methods: The cases of four ileostomy patients experiencing severe, challenging PSCs refractory to appliance changes, conventional dressings and barrier creams are discussed

Versatility of a skin protectant ointment in managing moisture-associated skin damage caused by incontinence

Moisture-associated skin damage (MASD) is an umbrella term used to describe skin damage that occurs when there is prolonged exposure of the skin to excessive amounts of moisture, such as urine, faeces, saliva and perspiration (Gray et al, 2011; Dowsett and Allen, 2013). It can cause considerable pain, distress and discomfort for the patient and can significantly impact quality of life (Sibbald et al, 2003; Newman et al, 2007).
