Bringing care closer to home: Improving palliative care in remote, rural and island communities

Hospice UK, June 2025

This report is the first comprehensive policy report addressing the palliative care needs of adults and children in remote, rural, and island communities across the UK. Among other issues, the report shows that some district nurses are having to employ 'less qualified staff' to fill roles that require specialist palliative care skills because of recruitment challenges.

Exploring the association between safe staffing levels and nurses' health and well-being **Nursing Standard, June 2025**

There is a substantial body of evidence demonstrating that low nurse staffing levels can negatively affect the health and well-being of nurses. Given the challenges with nurse retention in the UK, there is a need for strategic workforce planning to address these issues. This article explores the association between safe staffing levels and nurses' health and well-being, with a focus on burnout, job satisfaction and intention to leave.

Understanding delays and interruptions in vital signs monitoring: A qualitative study of task prioritisation in acute hospital care

Vital signs monitoring is an important component of clinical practice in acute settings. In the UK, the NEWS2 is the system recommended for use. Using the Early Warning Scores correlates positively to reduced mortality. However, nurses juggle competing demands that affect their adherence to the recommended monitoring frequency. This study explored how nursing teams carry out vital sign observations while conceptualising which types of work deprioritise their performance of this task.
