Preceptorship Pulse Check

Florence Nightingale Foundation, June 2025

New research shows growth in support for new nurses and midwives but preceptorship gaps persist. The report also underscores the importance of preceptorship in staff retention: 74% of new registrants say the quality of their preceptorship influenced their decision to stay with or leave their organisation.

Raising the Curtain on Objective Structured Clinical Examination Practices in Nursing: A Scoping Review

Journal of Nursing Education, 2025;64(6):356–364

Amid calls to transform nursing curricula to competency-based education, assessments to capture the intricacy and complexity of practice remains inconsistent. The ubiquitous integration of the objective structured clinical examination (OSCE) in evaluation systems necessitated a consolidative review to determine practices that garner its effectiveness.

The effects of bullying on nurses' turnover intentions, patient care, and somatic health complaints: Examining the importance of staffing adequacy and stress mindsets **Nursing Outlook, Volume 73, Issue 3, May–June 2025**

Findings reveal that bullying indirectly increases turnover intentions, diminishes perceived quality of patient care, and elevates health complaints by increasing stress. Importantly, both adequate staffing and a stress-is-enhancing mindset can buffer nurses against these negative effects.

Children's nursing: how can childhood vaccination uptake improve?

Children's nurses have a vital role in communities to help unpick vaccine hesitancy and work towards herd immunity. With vaccine hesitancy ranking among the top threats to global health, is the NHS doing enough to get the black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) community on board with vaccines?

Exploring the importance of diet in healthy ageing

In this article, the authors provide an overview of nutrition in older adults, including the risk of malnutrition and the importance of hydration. The authors also discuss the role of









essential nutrients in supporting healthy ageing and consider how nurses might promote a healthy diet in older people using a person-centred approach.

Fungal infections: community nursing approaches to skin and nail care

Dermatophytes (ringworms) are possibly the most prevalent causes of human infection globally. At least 40 dermatophyte species infect humans. This article focuses on nursing approaches to managing skin and nail dermatophyte infections. Antifungal resistance is becoming more common. However, community nurses should address poor adherence and other possible causes of treatment failure before assuming antifungal resistance.

Grief, loss and adjustment for people with dementia

This article looks at how grief might be experienced by people diagnosed with dementia. It explores anticipatory grief as felt in the period immediately post diagnosis by people with dementia and how grief caused by a bereavement might be complicated by the presence of dementia. Importantly, it also looks at how nurses can support a person with dementia where grief may be present.

Revalidation: how can nurses gain their participatory CPD hours?

Nurses must complete 35 hours of CPD activity every three years for revalidation with the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC), and 20 of those hours must be participatory. The scope in nursing for participatory CPD – where the registrant interacts with fellow professionals – is broad and includes mentorship, peer reviewing, fact-finding about other relevant services and social media engagement on professional discussions.

Strategies for supporting neurodivergent nursing students in practice placements **Nursing Standard, June 2025**

Neurodivergent conditions include autism, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and dyslexia. An increasing number of people with these conditions are entering higher education. Neurodivergent nursing students may experience increased challenges during their practice placements and require reasonable adjustments to be made.
